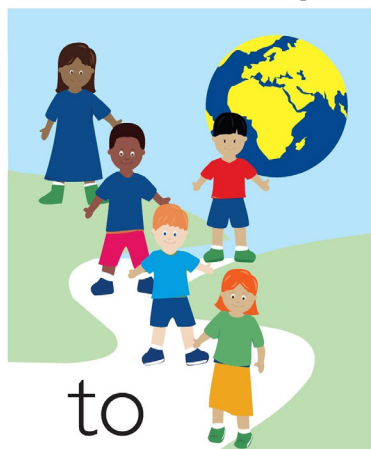

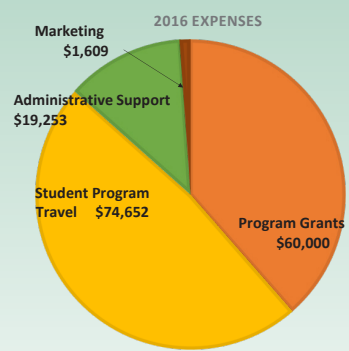
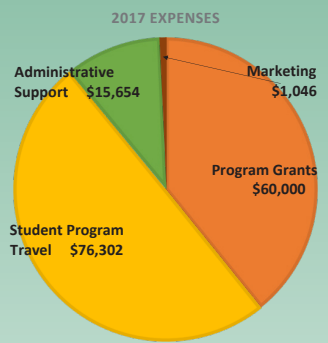

PATHWAYS TO CHILDREN UNIVERSITY OF MINNESOTA SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH COLLABORATIO

In 2017 four University of Minnesota School of Public Health graduate students traveled to Kolkata, India where they continue to develop and advance the Community Health (Public Health) program at our Jan Seva school. They were able to achieve incredible wins related to domestic violence and anger management workshops for parents. This Pathways collaboration with the University provides much needed health and disease prevention information and counsel while giving Public Health students from the U.S. avenues to implement health strategies in a culturally competent manner in poorly served countries.



ST. JOHN VIANNEY SEMINARIAN TRIP TO KOLKATA

In January 2018, Pathways funded and accompanied 12 seminarians, Father Borello and Father Becker from St. John Vianney Seminary to Kolkata on a Mission of Mercy with the sisters of Mother Teresa. The Seminary found the first trip in 2017 so important to the seminarians in their priestly formation that St. John Vianney requested Pathways to set up another trip. Most of the seminarians would never have had the opportunity or means for an experience like this. It not only greatly strengthened their faith but more importantly helped them to understand the importance of being attentive to the needs of their neighbors, especially those on the margins and in extreme poverty.



ZEMENE'S SCHOOL IN ETHIOPIA

309 children now attend the school with four classrooms in Belesa, Ethiopia that was completed this past year. Funds were raised by Pathways, the school was constructed by the local American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and handed over to the local community education office. Grace Strangis, Executive Director, will be attending the dedication later this year.



BOGOTA, COLOMBIA

In partnership with Minneapolis Cristo Rey Jesuit High School and Bogota Colegio Anexo San Francisco de Asis, Pathways again was able to give 13 students this past year the opportunity to travel to Bogota, Colombia and work side-by-side with local students on volunteer projects including building a house (shown above) for a family. The Bogota students who were hosts for the trip will come to Minneapolis in June, 2018 for a visit planned by Cristo Rey students.
